REFLECTION

Often we fall into the trap of thinking that rewards will get people to want to do better, when what we have effectively done is to alienate them from their truest, deepest desires. He offered them, but the challenge of the cross. Through this, He engaged those who followed Him and offered them the opportunity to be part of something noble and humane. By making discipleship challenging, Jesus brought His disciples to a deeper awareness of where their value lay as persons. Do we provide opportunities for those we accompany to discover their potential to be generous? How have we challenged our students or co-workers? Do we live in a way that challenges others to become generous?

RESPONSE

Jesus, our Brother, help us to accept today the tensions that come with daily living. Help us not to want comfort too much for fear of losing the opportunity to discover You. As we lose ourselves for Your sake today, may we be reborn to new life. AMEN.

A specially made granite marker stands on it to immortalize its significance. Justice Jose Mendoza, pioneer Batch '63, and Mr. Elmer Almodovar, a pioneer administrator, were among those who spoke on the special occasion. in behalf of their contemporaries.

On the other hand, the grand launching served as the ultimate expression of the DLSL community's gratitude for the overwhelming blessings of the institution for the past 50 years. Each member of the community participated in an array of fun-filled yet meaningful extravaganzas. Opening the program with a concelebrated Holy Mass led by His Eminence Cardinal Gaudencio Rosales, the event was also graced by Batangas Vice Gov. Mark Leviste and Lipa City Mayor Meynard Sabili.

PROJECT FREE

PROJECT FREE (Flagships to Reach Educational Excellence) is a special project of the Eduardo Cojuangco Foundation and the University of St. La Salle, in collaboration with the DepEd and the Tarlac State University. It provides competitive scholarship grants open to the public elementary and secondary school teachers of the Province of Tarlac.

Launched in July 2010, around 2,000 teachers availed of full scholarship grants and transportation subsidy for various graduate programs: Master of Arts in Teaching (MAT) with eleven specializations, Master in Educational Management (MEM), Master of Education (MAEd) with seven specializations and Doctor of Education (EdD).

The first batch, consisting of around 850 MAT scholars, graduated last 23 June. Around 600 MAEd and MEM scholars are expected to graduate in November 2012,

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while 120 EdD scholars are due to graduate in June 2013.

Project FREE Tarlac traces its roots to a long tradition of collaboration between the University of St. La Salle and Amb. Eduardo Cojuangco and his family. Since 1999, Amb. Cojuangco has funded Project FREE for the 4th District of Negros Occidental, where over 1,300 public elementary and secondary school teachers obtained their masteral and doctoral degrees within a threeyear period, Project COPS, which funded the graduate studies of 120 police officers in Negros Occidental and Bacolod City, and Project Learn and Earn, which funded the skills training of almost 1,000 out-of-school youth in various TESDA-certified programs.

Deeply sharing the Lasallian Mission of evangelization through education, Amb. Cojuangco is the lead donor of the University's scholarship program with special focus on the public school sector, through the teachers and the out-of-school youth. —**From Dr. Elsie Coscolluela**

BR. MIKEY'S SINGAPORE VISIT



In 1851, Fr. Jean Marie Beurel brought six Christian Brothers to Singapore and Malaysia, establishing the first Lasallian Presence in Asia. One hundred sixty years later, we look at where this presence has spread in Singapore.

Education is very essential to Singaporeans and the eight Lasallian schools in the country administer to that need. These schools are: four Primary (St. Joseph's Institution – Junior, St. Stephen's School, St. Anthony's Primary School and De La Salle School), three Secondary (St. Joseph's Institution, St. Patrick's School and St. Joseph's Institution – International), and one Tertiary (La Salle College of the Arts). With the Ministry of Education's extensive support in the country's schools (including Lasallian schools). I must say that they do a terrific job in ensuring good, guality education for its citizens.

Just like the country, the Brothers' community in SJI is a multi-national one. Brs. Jason and Paul are Malaysians, Br. George is American, Br. Kennedy is Indian, Br. Arian is Filipino and Br. Dominic is the only Singaporean in the community. While SJI is a mixture of nationalities. St. Pat's is homogenous, consisting purely

of Singaporeans, Brs. Nicolas, Collin, and Gregory. The Brothers are actively involved in the three secondary schools as teachers and administrators and they do regular visits to other La Salle schools. Aside from educational institutions, the Sector has an apostolate called Hopehouse (patterned from Bahay Pag-asa) managed by Br. Collin Wee FSC.

I spent four full days visiting the different La Salle schools in Singapore; interviewing, documenting and digesting all the information I acquired in the process. The Sector Leader, Br. Paul, was gracious enough to tour me around the island and teach me how to use the public transport systems (bus and MRT). I admire Br. Nicolas' patience in explaining to me Singapore's Educational System, which follows the British style of teaching. Brs. Jason and Arian exposed me to their classes and gave me some time to talk to their students in SJI and SJII, respectively. Br. Collin oriented me with the Hopehouse ministry during my visit there. And Bernard Teo, a former Brother and currently a faculty of SJI. enlightened me with the Lasallian culture and mission in Singapore. Thanks to them, the week I spent in Singapore gave me fruitful lessons and insightful realizations that broadened my horizons regarding the Lasallian Mission in LEAD. -By Br. Mikey Cua FSC

FROM LUZON TO MINDANAO: DLSU-D CYCLISTS BIKE FOR A CAUSE



Two bikers from De La Salle University-Dasmariñas (DLSU-D), Frederick Agustin and Gio Paolo Espital, pedalled their way across the Philippines in a project dubbed "**The Amazing Raise: A Bike-For-A-Cause from Luzon to Mindanao.**" The project helped raise funds that will benefit the One La Salle Scholarship Fund (OLSF) Campaign and Project Carbon Neutral (PCN), both projects of De La Salle Philippines (DLSP). This event was part of the culminating activities of the Centennial Celebration of Lasallian Presence in the Philippines.

The 1,500 km journey started on 15 June at Jaime Hilario Integrated School-La Salle in Bagac, Bataan. They pedalled their way to the rest of the 17 La Salle schools in the Philippines until finally reaching their last stop, De La Salle John Bosco College in Bislig City, Surigao Del Sur.

Agustin and Espital conceived the project after reflecting on what they could contribute to the Centennial Celebration and promote biking as a healthy and eco-friendly lifestyle as well. Espital, a community development graduate of DLSU-D, works for a nongovernment organization, while Agustin, who finished his Bachelor of Arts in Communication also from DLSU-D, is a graphic artist at the DLSU-D Marketing Communications Office.
