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

'You have to read as much as you can and whenever you can," emphasized Mrs Favis.

Having a thesaurus while reading is another tip that the brilliant speaker gave the writers. According to her, one has to be "word smart" if he/she wants to become a better writer.

Another tip Mrs Favis explained is to find a happy place. It is a peaceful and quiet place to write about happy thoughts. It can be a bedroom, the kitchen or any place where one can be alone and read or write. She suggested playing appropriate music while one is writing. The right music helps the writer be in the right mood.

Keeping a small journal is another tip that the jolly speaker shared. She said that this journal should keep all the writing details and ideas that the writer remembers.

"You have to write whenever inspiration hits you," Mrs Favis said.

One of the best tips that the participants heard from the speaker was to take advantage of technology in improving their writing skills. She explained that one can self -publish his/her works by being a blogger.

Mrs Favis gave some tips on writing fiction, too.

In the end, she inspired the crowd to keep on writing. After all, according to her, "No writing is ever wasted."

Last February 3, the Grade 2 visited the Metro Manila Development Authority (MMDA) Park for their Alternative Learning Experience (ALE) this academic year.














The young Lasallians listened to an MMDA instructor and learned about the many road signs through lively songs and a short talk.








"He will come back. He always does. We have a place for him."


