scientists are able to formulate a treatment for this disease.

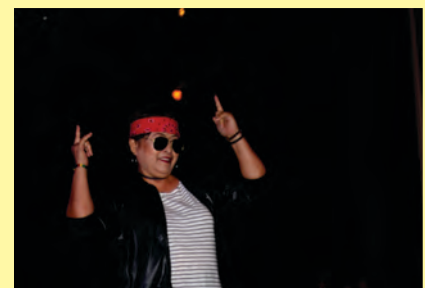

The Weird Mess Known as Pokémon Sword and Shield (spoilers ahead)

WELCOME TO THE GALAR REGION! THE REGION YOU EXPLORE IN THE NEWEST INSTALLMENT OF THE POKÉMON MAIN SERIES, WITH BUSTLING TOWNS, DIVERSE PEOPLE, AMAZING POKÉMON, AND THE "EXPANSIVE" WILD AREA.

BUT WAS THIS GAME AS AMAZING AS IT WAS MADE OUT TO BE...?

Regarding all the controversy surrounding it, people are very divided with their opinions regarding the game, with many defending the game and Game Freak themselves (these people have sometimes been called "apologists"), and those heavily criticising Game Freak for their "laziness", and the claimed "ack" of quality the game offers, despite the game's price being at 60 dollars for a copy of the game, and 30 dollars for additional content (the Expansion Pack; will talk about later). This started many feuds involving both sides, which probably left the Pokémon fanbase the most divided it has ever been.

What's new in this "new" installment of the franchise?

Just like previous installments, there would be a new mechanic or feature in the game, and in this game, it is known as Dynamax, and basically, your Pokémon grows to a gigantic size for three turns, and are able to perform very powerful attacks. In some special cases, specific Pokémon are able to Gigantamax, changing their appearance, and it also allows them to get a signature move, such as Gigantamax Charizard, which gains G-Max Wildfire as its signature move.

If you think about it, the Dynamax mechanic seems like it reuses a lot of properties of previous battle mechanics. Gigantamax forms are similar to Mega Evolution, in the sense that the Pokémon gets a new form, and that these unique forms are only exclusive to specific Pokémon. Dynamax/Gigantamax is also similar to Z-moves, wherein a Pokémon, once per battle, can use powerful moves, some with additional effects. There are also Pokémon exclusive Z-moves, and again,

it's just like Gigantamax. It's sad that this "new" mechanic rehashes several things that made the older mechanics so fresh and special, and it's salt on wound that they had completely eradicated Mega Evolution and Z-Moves from the game in lieu of a mechanic I find unoriginal.

There is also Pokémon Camp, where you can play with your Pokémon, in a similar fashion to Pokémon Amie and Pokémon Refresh from previous generations. You can also cook delicious Curries for you and your Pokémon to enjoy. It was a very wholesome experience to see your Pokémon have fun with you, cooking Curries and the like. Though they removed other things from like the mini-games from Pokémon Amie, Poffins, and Pokébeans, and the saddest of all, you can't pet your Pokémon anymore (this... is upsetting), I do find it charming how Pokémon interact with their trainer and other Pokémon as well. It adds something unique and cute to the Pokémon Amie formula.

The Story and Characters

Oh? The story? It's somewhat lackluster. The characters are decent, especially the Gym Leaders and Rivals (although Bede and Marnie couldn't really develop as much as Hop, as he hogged all the rival screentime), but there isn't really too much in the narrative that I found amazing. It's nice that as you progress in the game, more and more people recognize you as a powerful Pokémon Trainer, as Gym Battles take place in gigantic stadiums to accommodate Dynamax Battles. And even with the stadium and crowd's size, they are able to broadcast these battles, so even more people can see you. I find the fact that battling is an integral part of Galar's culture, and with Gym Battles feeling more

important, I feel like they really improved the Gym Challenge formula.

However, there is the problem of the antagonist, or lack thereof. Team Yell, despite being established as the "evil team" of the game, barely does anything that harms the region, and this is compared to other Pokémon villains, who take it to the extremes in order to accomplish their goal. Then, there's Macro Cosmos, Chairman Rose's company, which barely has a hint of being truly evil. Seriously, they even ask if you have insurance! Even Rose himself had no malicious intent when summoning Eternatus, the Legendary Pokémon that went haywire, summoning the Darkest Day for the second time onto Galar. Rose's reason to summon it? He was scared of the Galar region completely running out of energy, and Eternatus was the answer, as it could produce limitless amounts of energy. So in short, Rose was just impatient and was scared for the future. I find it odd that they didn't give a true threat aside from Eternatus. Even Team Yell is relatively harmless, just being a group of Gym Trainers from Pier's Gym, willing to cheer for Marnie during her gym challenge. So basically, the "evil team" was nothing more than an odd plot device.

Gameplay and Others

Do you have what it takes to feel exactly the same from your

previous installments, yet feel inherently worse than them?

Take notes from the pros, Pokémon Sword and Shield, as the gameplay is comparable to games that have been released years ago.

The Wild Area seems very small, despite how expansive it seems to be and it can take only a couple of minutes to get to certain areas. The movable camera exclusive to the Wild Area ONLY is something the mainline Pokémon series has never touched on. Games two decades older have fully functioning, free moving cameras, while Game Freak hadn't caught on.

Do you want to connect with friends in this installment? Well, I hope you have the patience to do so. As I said, they took away many great features in lieu for worse ones (well, Pokémon Camp was fine, I guess), like the absolute LEGEND known as the PSS (Player Search System). Were you ever looking for some battles to connect with others or a Pokémon you wanted badly? Well, the PSS was the best way to do so... in the past Pokémon titles. Instead we have the much more inconvenient Y-Comm, a miserable way to connect with other players. Seriously, the PSS (Player Search System) was such a simple and intuitive way to connect with others, and I really wish we got that over the Y-Comm.

Though I have been complaining a ton about the gameplay, the battle system

is still intact, and if you dig deeper and see all of the interesting and sophisticated ways to battle, using fun gimmicks, and more, such as using a team based around weathers, and other mechanics in the game, it's nice to see how the competitive scene is still active and fun to play. Though, in some cases, especially in casual playthroughs, you would see how most would aim only for super-effective hits, and nothing more. No setup, strategy, or anything, but that's okay. Play the game the way you want to play; there is no right or wrong way.

The Soundtrack

FINALLY, I can talk more positively about the game! The soundtrack is most likely the thing I love the most about the game, and it probably makes up for some of the faults this game has. Mostly because they used unique sounds and instruments this time around, and it gives the themes an added layer of depth and detail. Notable ones include Motostoke's starting off with a bell tower ringing is very nice reference, most of the themes relating to the Legendary Wolves having the sound of wolves howling somewhat eerily, and others.

Many themes are just incredible and just bangers in general, such as Bede's themes, the Gym Leader battle theme, and much more. I could not think of any themes I found terrible, and so many of them were crafted with so much care. I just wish they also cared enough for the game's quality and not just the music's...

The Pokémon

If you play in a new Pokémon game, then there

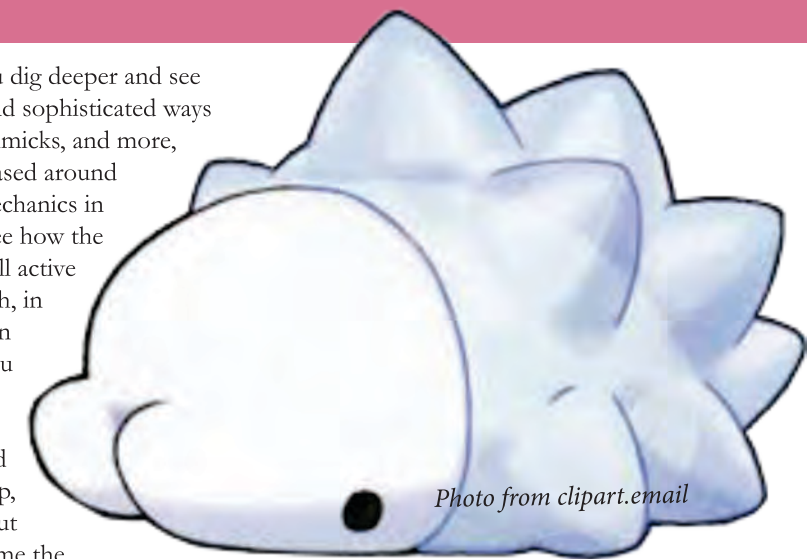

would be new and unique Pokémon added to the already wide roster, and just like the last Generation, the 7th, then the new "Regional Variants" were revealed, being the "Alolan Forms", where older Pokémon would get new forms exclusive to a certain region, where they would gain a new typing, ability, movepool, and more. Then, when Galar was announced, and there were the "Galarian Forms", which has the same premise as the Alolan variants, but more fit into the theme of Galar.

The Pokémon added to the new region are very interesting, and so are their origins. Despite it being only a few months since the game released, many have grown on me, such as the battle-ready Falinks, based off the pharynx formation, the ice cold Snom, indubitably the greatest Pokémon to ever exist, and the slippery Eiscue, with its cute Pingu looking head, and many others have amazing concepts and designs, that have grown on me, and shows me that they did not slack in terms of Pokémon design. Sometimes.

Conclusion

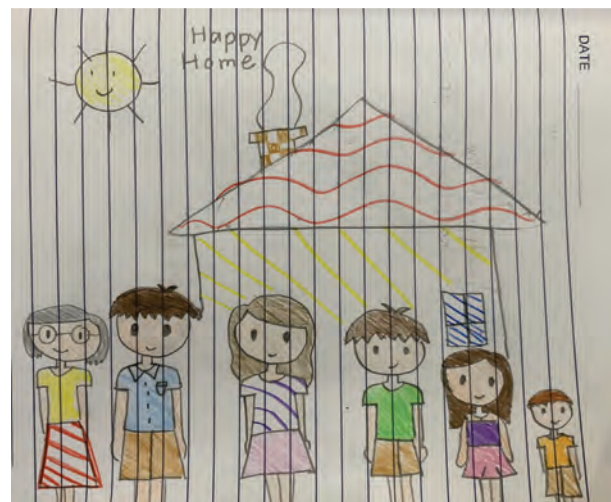
This game does not really fit the standard that many games of the last decade have set. Sword and Shield feel like games that came out many years ago, in the graphics and animation. Seriously, Lego Star Wars has better quality than this game. Games like Super Mario Odyssey, The Legend of Zelda Breath of the Wild, Dragon Quest 11, all came out in the era of 2017-2019, and they are really high quality games. Why? Fighting for what is rightfully ours

My name is Isabel M. Peralta. I am an 11-year-old, Grade 6 student at De La Salle Santiago Zobel School (DLSZ) and a proud Filipino.

A few weeks ago, we were given projects by our teachers in completion of our end-term tasks, aiming to promote social awareness on the present territorial dispute in the West Philippine Sea. With the help of our Social Studies teachers, Ms. Julie Agudo and Ms. Rebecca Dela Rosa, we have integrated our projects from different subject areas to produce an infomercial using our media learning devices. Through the social media platform Facebook, we disseminated the information to allow a larger audience to view.

To date, our infomercials have garnered thousands of views, but we need more people to see and hear what we have to say. While many other videos with no social

relevance have trended worldwide, what I do not understand is why isn't ours being viewed as much, when we are spreading information that could help our country's future become more economically stable; when we are standing up for our rights as Filipinos; when we, even at a young age, are pushing to fight for what is rightfully ours. Have we, as Filipinos, just accepted that we are helpless in this situation? Have we given up hope on taking back what belongs to us? Do we just don't care at all? Or don't we have enough information to know how significant this issue is to the future of our country?

With all these questions in mind, I did my own research. I asked my family what they knew about the territories and was told by my uncles that they used to freely fish around one of the islands that China is claiming as theirs now. That island now referred to as Panatag

Shoal, used to be called Bajo de Masinloc. My uncles still refer to it as such. They knew firsthand that in the past, China has never claimed it as theirs because there were no Chinese vessels manning the shoal and it was mostly Filipinos and some Taiwanese who were fishing in those areas. The more I learned about the issue, the more questions I had—why has it only been in the past couple of years that China has begun claiming ownership of the territories? If it was really theirs from the beginning as they have claimed it to be, why are they protecting it just now? What have they discovered recently, that fired up their claim to those territories?

I once again did more research and discovered that there are so much resources, including oil, in the West Philippine Sea territories. What started as a school project pushed me to take a bigger stand in

this issue. I am blessed to have teachers who not only provided us with this much awareness, but are encouraging us to be part of the solution.

As students, as Filipino youth, and as the future of our nation, we are now pleading to the government to hear what we have to say in asking them to give more importance to the issue of reclaiming the West Philippine Sea.

Our school President, Brother Bernie Oca once told me—you have the opportunity now to be able to take a stand! Hold your head up high and fight for what is right and true. And those words, Brother Bernie, I take by heart. I love my country and I love being a Filipino. We should all be part of the solution by learning more about the issue and spreading awareness about it.

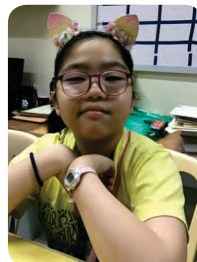
